02/02/2015 Jesus' Great Kingdom

"For he has rescued us from the dominion of darkness and brought us into the kingdom of the Son he loves, in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins" (Col.1:13-14).

During the time before Jesus, and after Him, cities and empires were for the most part ruled by kings or emperors. Regular people, like farmers and craftsmen, mostly depended upon the wisdom and benevolence of the king. People would flourish when the king was a good and wise man and was balanced in his enforcement of just ways. In reality, it was a good and efficient system of government with an ideal king. The problems lied in that there were no earthly kings that lived up to the ideal. The metaphor used in today's verse talks about an ideal kingdom... The kingdom of heaven, meaning the church, has an ideal king and an ideal government. As is true with metaphors, the church is not like a kingdom in all respects, just like it is not exactly like a body, or a building, or a family.. We need to understand, however, the ideal of a kingdom being applied to the church illustrates important aspects of what Christ wants His people to be. Jesus is indeed like a king, in the glory and honor that is due to Him, and in the obedience to His commands. The task we face as the church, His subjects, is to read His Word and decide what he wants Christians to be and do. As much as we like America's system of government in which we get to vote our leader in and out of office, in the church there is no voting. Jesus did everything He was called upon to do to become the King of the church, and we're to lean totally upon Him. I'm reminded of a famous old hymn..."What a fellowship, what a joy divine, leaning on the everlasting arms; What a blessedness, what a peace is mine, Leaning on the everlasting arms... Leaning, leaning, Safe and secure from all alarms; Leaning, leaning, Leaning on the everlasting arms..." Its a really good metaphor....

02/03/2015 God's Household

"Although I hope to come to you soon, I am writing you these instructions so that, if I am delayed, you will know how people ought to conduct themselves in God's household, which is the church of the living God, the pillar and foundation of the truth" (1 Tim.3:14-15).

In the last metaphor of this series about the church, the apostle Paul compares it to God's household...It is not quite the same as comparing it to a family or a building. I see that comparing the church to a household shows that it is a group of people that are united not only by their values, but to a common commitment to a way of life. When its members assemble for worship on Sunday morning, or go to work on Monday, its conduct is to be guided by that

commitment that each one has made as a member of God's household. Behavior within God's household is not limited to a Bible class or worship on the Lord's Day

How a member of God's household acts comprises the way one treats his fellow workers on the job, and a willingness to give an honest day's work for a day's pay. It makes up the way one treats their husband or wife with consideration and respect. It includes the way we treat our neighbors and a willingness to help them when they are in need. We will scrupulously live according to God's Word, when we keep ours. It is easy to see why this metaphor about His church is used... The way we compose ourselves each day is the reflection of being a part of God's household...

"Your love has given me great joy and encouragement, because you, brother, have refreshed the hearts of the saints" (Philemon 7).

One of the special things about going to show or sporting event is the time we take to have some refreshments... At a ballgame it may be a hot dog, bag of peanuts, ice cream or cotton candy (a personal favorite). Its not that we really need these things for sustenance, but its just the joy they bring in the form of a refreshment. The apostle Paul had written a letter to a man in Colossae named Philemon. Apparently, during Paul's ministry in Ephesus, Philemon had heard the gospel and was saved. If we read the short letter we will find that he opened his home for others believers and actually established a church there. While Paul was in prison, he heard about Philemon's love and faith, and was encouraged that someone that he had helped lead to Christ was sharing his faith with others. Nothing could have pleased him more than to know of Philemon's love for Jesus and all the saints... The thing that actually caught my attention in today's passage is the part about the refreshments... "because you, brother, have refreshed the hearts of the saints..." How great it would be for us to have more refreshing people like this in our lives... I'll take it one step farther... How great would it be if we were the ones doing the refreshing? Take a moment today to encourage someone, speak kindly to them, compliment them and thank them for what they do. The world could use a few more refreshment stands...

02/05/2015 Getting Your Mind Right "We demolish arguments and every pretension that sets itself up against the knowledge of God, and we take captive every thought to make it obedient to Christ" (2 Cor.10:5).

In the movie Cool Hand Luke, (1967) Luke (Paul Newman) is on a southern chain gang. He is rebellious, and the captain (Strother Martin) makes it his mission to get him straightened out. Here's a famous quote from the movie; "You run one time, you got yourself a set of chains. You run twice you got yourself two sets. You ain't gonna need no third set, 'cause you gonna get your mind right. I mean RIGHT." The battles we fight in life all begin in our minds and it is easy to develop negative thoughts that often come to our conscious selves... The apostle Paul gives us his version of getting our minds right in today's verse, when he writes that we take captive every thought. He even tells us why.... To make it obedient to God.... Whether this entails defending our faith or guiding our actions, Paul says that we've got to get our minds right. Notice that the words don't say part of our thoughts and some of the time. We must learn to take captive every thought! Satan, the world and our flesh try their hardest to bring evil thoughts into our minds. The battle is set... Who wins? The winner is the one who takes every thought captive in obedience to Christ. I'll have some thoughts tomorrow about how to achieve this...

"Do not conform any longer to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is --- his good, pleasing and perfect will" (Rom.12:2).

The apostle Paul, in 1 Cor.10:5, told us that we are to take every thought captive to make it obedient to Christ... It is obvious that our actions are dictated by what goes on in our minds, so the big problem seems to revolve around how to take our thoughts captive. We must learn to capture the negative thoughts that would lead us astray, and this can only take place when we have a renewed mind. Today's verse is one that you have probably read many times, but perhaps not from this context... A renewed mind comes from a heart that has been captivated by the love and grace of Jesus Christ. It is only then that we can take every thought captive and obey Christ...Taking a few thoughts captive is difficult in itself, but we are called to take every thought captive. So... How do we even begin to do this? It is only when our minds are renewed that we are able to think Godly thoughts. Paul gives us one more suggestion about getting our minds right... "Finally, brothers, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable --- if anything is excellent or praiseworthy --- think about such things." (Phil.4:8). Paul says that we should fill our minds with good stuff... He finishes in the next verse by telling us to put these into practice. The combination of virtues

listed here is sure to produce a wholesome thought pattern, which in turn will result in a life or moral and spiritual excellence...

"Acknowledge and take to heart this day that the Lord is God in heaven above and on earth below. There is no other. Keep His decrees and commands...."

(Deut.4:39-40). We must learn --- and then consider what we learn --- about God. We must practice meditation, reflection, and serious thought about God every day to keep Him real to

02/12/2015 The Ultimate Kingdom

"In the same time of those kings, the God of heaven will set up a kingdom that will never be destroyed, nor will it be left to another people. It will crush all those kingdoms and bring them to an end, but it will endure forever" (Dan.2:44)

In today's passage, Daniel has interpreted a dream for the Babylonian king, Nebuchadnezzar. The dream was about a large statue made of layers of gold, silver, bronze and iron. These different metals of which the statue were made represented the physical kingdoms that would exist from Babylon to Rome... The last kingdom, (Rome) of which the feet were made, would be mixed with clay. The clay would make the last kingdom fragile. Daniel recognizes that an eternal kingdom would supercede all of the earthly kingdoms... Its authority, built on the sinful empires of the world, would extend over the whole earth... "But the rock that struck the statue became a huge mountain and filled the whole earth" (V 35). That's a very powerful kingdom. That kingdom is the church, founded by Jesus Christ. Jesus and the apostles embraced a concept that the world has never truly accepted, especially as we look at the turmoil in the Middle East today... The concept, even among Christians today, is unfortunately in short supply. This is the concept: The way of power and the way of peace work hand in hand. Victory and weakness are not mutually exclusive. The New Testament defines the stone that God carved from the mountain as the kingdom that began at the crucifixion... It is the church, built by Jesus Christ... Here's what the leader of the kingdom said to world-weary people everywhere and for all time: "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest... for I am gentle and humble in heart and you will find rest for your souls.... (Matt.11:28-29). He welcomes us to the ultimate kingdom....

Christians do not pledge themselves to some abstract system of rulership. The apostle Paul wrote this to Timothy: "because I know whom I have believed..." (2 Tim.1:12) Paul knew that Jesus was reigning from God's right hand. "And the disciples were first call Christians at Antioch" (ACts 11:26). Christian is the universal designation for those who claim to be members of His kingdom and pledge their allegiance to Him... The church is His kingdom epitomized.... Enjoy your membership...

All during His recorded lifetime, He went about doing good. In His crucifixion, he showed the ultimate act of giving, as He laid down His own life for the sinners of the world... He never complained when He was tired and hungry... In the sixth chapter of the Book of Mark, Jesus and His disciples were so busy ministering to others that they couldn't even find the time to eat. When they went to a solitary place to rest, the people kept coming, "so He began teaching them many things..." (V 34). Jesus asks us to get out of our comfort zones and serve others. In 2 Cor.12:14-15, the apostle Paul said he was willing to spend and expend himself for others. We ought to be glad when called upon to use ourselves up for others, because in doing so, we actually become stronger. In Matt.25:31-46, Jesus tells us that when we do things for others, we are doing them for Him. He said: "whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did for me" (V 40). 02/21/2015 Some Excellent Knowledge

"I also count all things loss for the excellence of the knowledgeof Christ Jesus my Lord...." (Phil.3:8).

We spend our entire lives gathering knowledge. Some of that knowledge may allow us to be a whiz when we watch Jeopardy, and there is nothing wrong with a curious and inquiring mind. Do you think the apostle Paul had this kind of knowledge in mind when he wrote today's verse? I am sure that Paul was a very smart fellow, but the knowledge that he is referencing here is about Jesus. He wants to know Jesus as well as he possibly can, and it appears that he wants us to follow suit... Lets take a look at the excellence of the knowledge of Jesus Christ to see just what makes it so desirable of a commodity for Paul and us to gain... I would think first of all, that this knowledge has to be personal to each one of us. We might have initially learned about Jesus from someone else, but we must come to truly know Him for ourselves. Notice that Paul uses the "first person pronoun" in today's verse, as he does in verse ten (10). "I want to know Christ and the power of His resurrection...." Along with being personal, the knowledge of Jesus must be loving, tender and affectionate. In 1958, Phil Spector wrote a song and recorded it with his group, The Teddy Bears, entitled "To Know Him Is To Love Him" The song is about how a

girl feels for a boy, but its words are strangely applicable... "To know, know, know him is to love, love, love him Just to see him smile, makes my life worthwhile. We must look at His works both past and present and see how they dovetail into our present and future as we look at where He is today... This is what I call excitement, because the more you know, the more you want to know! When we start learning about Jesus, as we see in today's verses, we find that in Him "are hidden all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge..." "I have told you these things, so that in me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world" (Jn.16:33). As we grow in the knowledge of Jesus Christ we should find an excitement that is punctuated by joy....
