As Jesus states in today's verse, No one comes to the Father except through Me... Paul cuts through all the red tape when he says this; "For me, to live is Christ, and to die is gain..." (Phil.1:21). Lets just remember to live each moment of every day knowing that we are preparing to meet the Lord...

# What Is Your Life? A Life Of Building

"Why, you do not even know what will happen tomorrow. What is Your life?" (Jas.4:14) "By the grace God has given me, I laid a foundation as an expert builder, and someone else is building on it. But each one should be careful how he builds..." (1 Cor.3:10).

In the 3rd chapter of 1st Corinthians, the apostle Paul is very succinct about the divisions in the church that were caused by jealously and quarreling. He had to get them back to their roots in order to solve the problem(s), so he reminded them of this: "I planted the seed, Apollos watered it, but God made it grow..." (Vs.6), Apollos watered, as he worked with the new Christians in the church that Paul had got going, but Paul was quick to point this out... "For we are all God's fellow workers; you are God's field, God's building... (Vs. 9). We could stop here and the point would be made, but Paul knew the real importance of this teaching, so he went on... As we look at today's verse, we see the crux of Paul's message. Our building must be built on a foolproof foundation. I spent several years at Harding University, (college then) and each day I walked by the Bible Building. Inscribed on it was this verse: (KJV) "For other foundation can no man lay than that is laid, which is Christ Jesus." (Vs.11). Since our life is a period of building, we must conscientiously build on the rock that is Jesus Christ. With our foundation firmly in place, our building must reflect Christ's teachings each and every day. We are told that our building will be tested.... "If any man builds on this foundation using gold, silver, costly stones, wood, hay, or straw, his work will be tested for what it is, because the Day will bring it to light. It will be revealed with fire, and the fire will test the quality of each man's work. If what he has built survives, he will receive his reward..." (Vs.12-14). Finally, Paul reminds us that our building (body) is God's temple, and God's Spirit lives within us. (Vs.16). Our life is one of constant growth because we are building on Jesus' foundation. This building is always being looked at, and folks should see that we built it the right way...

"Why, you do not even know what will happen tomorrow. What is your life?" (Jas.4:14). But as for me and my household, we will serve the Lord" (Josh.24:15).

It is reputed that Napoleon Bonaparte once said this: "In every battle, there is a crisis, 10 or 15 minutes only, on which the outcome depends. To make proper use of this short space of time means victory; its neglect, defeat." I'm not sure this is true of every battle, but I get it... If we equate our life as a kind of battle, a decision or two may often decide a destiny. Humans are different from the other organisms that inhabit the earth in may ways. Perhaps the biggest way is the ability to make rational decisions. Decisions

that not only affect us in the present, but that will impact our futures. Today's verse is a monumental one for the Israelite people. After escaping the Egyptians and wandering somewhat aimlessly for 40 years, they have crossed the Jordan River and are in the land promised to them by God... They now face a decision that will impact them and their families for the rest of their lives... Will they serve the God who has brought them to this point, or the gods of the land's inhabitants. Joshua's words echo down through the corridors of time, right to this very moment... "Then choose this day whom you will serve." Decisions face us each day, but no other has the magnitude of this one. We have the words of the writer of the Book of Hebrews in 10:24-25 about building one another up and meeting together. But perhaps the most convincing words come from the mouth of Jesus Himself... "But seek first His kingdom and His righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well..." (Matt.6:33). Our most important decisions concern right and wrong, truth and error, God or Satan... Life is a multiplicity of choices. lets choose well...

The psalmist uses the term evening shadow in 102:1. Whichever terminology is applied, I think the message comes across to us in a crystal clear manner. Life is brief. You are like a mist that appears for a little while and then vanishes... Is the Bible being just a bit maudlin in its view about the brevity of life? I think not ... That in the grand scheme of things the amount of time we have on earth is fleeting is just what it is. This doesn't mean that we should throw up our hands in frustration... It only tells us that we should live in the moment and savor what we have. Amusement parks make lots of money on the premise that we will like to be titillated for short periods of time. Many of the most pleasurable things we do in life do not last very long, but we don't stop doing them, do we? A recurring theme in the "Back To The Future" movies is that one's future in not prerecorded. I believe that the message for us is this: We must live in the moment, but with eager anticipation of what lies ahead. If we go back to that amusement park, how long are folks willing to stay in a long line for that momentary thrill? The Bible is all about getting us to live our lives the way the Lord wants us to, showing us that this is where true happiness lies. Let me finish with the words of the Psalmist..."So teach us to number our days, that we may present to You a heart of wisdom..." (90:12). Wake up each morning saying that life is good...

# Being A Wise Person - Live A Good Life

"Who is wise and understanding among you? Let him show it by living his good life, by deeds done in the humility that comes from wisdom..." (Jas.3:13).

As we take a look this week at what it takes to be a wise person, we don't even have to leave Jas.3:13. My premise for the week revolves around the first part of the verse... "Who is wise and understanding among you." The question is so important because it plumbs the very depth of our lives. We all want to have the wherewithal to make good decisions in our lives. The making of these good decisions certainly revolves around wisdom. Early in his reign, God appeared to Solomon in the night and posed this question; "Ask for whatever you want me to give you" (2 Chron.1:7). Here is Solomon's answer; "Give me wisdom and knowledge, that I may lead this people, for who is able to govern this great people of yours?" (Vs.10). Was God impressed with this request? "Since this is your heart's desire and you have not asked for wealth, riches or honor, nor for the death of your enemies, and since you have not asked for a long life but for wisdom and knowledge to govern my people over whom I have made you king, therefore wisdom and knowledge will be given to you..." (Vs.11-12) You bet He was!!!!! If we take a look at the 2nd part of today's verse, James hits a home run about what it means to both attain wisdom and use it properly...

"Let him show it by living his good life, by deeds done in humility that comes from wisdom." James points out that true wisdom comes from above, and it is wise to be good and foolish to be bad... There are many smart people out there in the world that are just brimming with knowledge. Knowledge that is proud and conceited will not do the good things or live the good life it is supposed. I find the key word written by James about the good life one is to live, to be humility. I will finish this devotional with words from the apostle Paul. "Do not deceive yourselves. If any one of you thinks he is wise by the standards of this age, he should become a "fool" so that he may become wise. For the wisdom of this world is foolishness in God's sight. As it is written: 'He catches the wise in their craftiness', and again, 'The Lord knows that the thoughts of the wise are futile...' " (1 Cor.3:18-20). The person who gets wisdom from above, lives a good life shown by deeds done in humility...

### Who Is A Wise Person - Listens To Counsel

"Who is wise and understanding among you? (Jas.3:13). "The way of a fool seems right to him, but a wise man listens to advice" (Prov.12:15).

As we continue our study of what constitutes a wise person, we come to an aspect of wisdom that is often overlooked. It is overlooked for the most part because of a lack of humility that many folks have. I hearken back to my youth for a couple of gems about wisdom. My dad used to say this; "Never wise up a fool, because then he will try to make a fool out of you..." Perhaps a convoluted way to look at things, but I got the idea. A cousin of mine, though not a close one, said this; "When I'm right, I'm right... When I'm wrong, I'm right!" Perhaps you know from this why I was not very close to her. Lastly we look at the wisdom of Abraham Lincoln... Lincoln had one of the most diverse cabinets of all the presidents that preceded him, and he used these two rationales.... (1) "Keep you friends close, and your enemies closer..." (1) "I would rather have my enemies urinating out of my tent than into it..." (the original language was a bit "saltier"). Lincoln knew the benefits of getting wise counsel, even if it came from people he did not always agree with. As Christians, we must not put ourselves out on an island because that would make us foolish. Remember, we are studying about who is the wise person... No one can really tell a fool anything, as he or she must learn everything the hard way. Of course, we would be foolish not to use our Bibles as sources of wisdom, as Paul wrote to Timothy; "All scripture is God-breathed, and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting, and training in righteousness, so that the man of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work..." (2 Tim.3:16-17). There are so many important decisions we must make each day, so lets not be so foolish that we do not seek wise counsel. I'll leave you with several scriptures from the Book of Proverbs to read and meditate upon today. I think it would be wise of us to do this... Proverbs 11:14, 13:10, 19:20, 24:6, 27:9, 15:31-33. Perhaps you will find a few that you would like to share with me...

# Who Is A Wise Person - One Who Holds His Tongue

"Who is wise and understanding among you?" (Jas.3:13). "When words are many, sin is not absent, but he who holds his tongue is wise" (Prov.10:19).

How often has the proclivity to speak before we thought gotten us into trouble? I don't think that I can even count the times. The Book of Proverbs is filled with advice about speaking too much... "A man of knowledge uses words with restraint... (17:27).... "Even a fool is thought wise if he keeps silent, and discerning if he holds his tongue" (17:28). "A fool utters all his mind..." (29:11) As we continue on with this study about who is a wise person, the things we say certainly have a prominent role. Lets be perfectly candid here... Our words are the way that we communicate our thoughts, so we cannot remain silent. But it is the quality and thoughtfulness of these words that mark the type of person we are, so it makes sense to choose them with care. It is clear that the words we choose to say lets folks around us know what we think. With this in mind it would seem that judicious thought should go into their choice... The Bible lets us know in very precise terms what the choice of good words can prevent... There's not enough space for me to write out all the verses, so its up to you to check them out... The wise man refrains from: cursing. (Ex.20:7), filthy language (Col.3:8), hasty words (Jas.1:19), Deceitful words (Jer.9:8), Falsely flattering words (Prov.26:28), and gossip (Lev.19:16). Slanderous words and gossip are a bane to our society, and especially to our church...There is and old story about a preacher who asked a women to do a strange thing. On a very windy day, he told her to go down the street and release a handful of feathers. When she came back he told her to retrace her steps and gather all the feathers that had been scattered... The woman replied that this would be utterly impossible because the wind had scattered them in all directions. The point was made! The scattered feathers are like words of slander and gossip.... It is impossible to call them back. Let me finish with the words of the apostle Peter; "Whoever would love life and see good days must keep his tongue from evil and his lips from deceitful speech" (1 Pet.3:10). Lets all show our wisdom by carefully choosing our words...

Who Is A Wise Person - The One Who Fears Evil

"Who is wise and understanding among you?" (Jas.3:13). "A wise man fears the Lord and shuns evil, but a fool is hot-headed and reckless" (Prov.14:16).

Have you ever heard someone say this? "I'll try anything once." Have you ever said it? The most deceitful and powerful thing we deal with today is sin. It would seem, according to today's verse, that its always been that way. It would also seem that the man the proverbial writer is speaking about in today's verse might be one of those, I'll try anything once folks. To me, here's the thing... A person truly needs wisdom so that he or she can discern between good and evil. Some evils out there are clear-cut and to avoid

them takes little effort. Those "wolf in sheep's clothing" things are the problem. By those I mean the things that appear good on the outside and lure us in, only to find the true evil on the inside...The great thing about belonging to a community of believers is the help and encouragement we can get from them to help us avoid the pitfalls of sin... "But encourage one another daily, as long as it is called Today, so that none of you may be hardened by sin's deceitfulness" (Heb.3:13). Obviously we have God's Word to lay out the guidelines for pure living, but it is comforting to know that there are those who care enough to encourage us along the way... Are we one of those encouragers? There are no magic rules out there that will guarantee us the elixir of discernment, but here are a couple of verses that come close... As the apostle Paul closes out his 1st letter to the church at Thessalonica, he writes this; "But examine everything carefully; hold fast to that which is good; abstain from every form of evil" (5:21-22). Lets face it.... Sin offers one thing, but gives something else. We should always be cautious of evil. Lets not be that fool who says they'll try anything once...

"Who is wise and understanding among you?" (Jas.3:13). "The desire of the righteous is a tree of life, and he who wins souls is wise" (Prov.11:30).

Jesus put the value of one's soul in bold perspective when he taught us with these words... "What good is it for a man to gain the whole world and lose his soul?" (Mk.8:36). Even if Jesus stopped with these words the value of the soul would be shown, but He continued on... "Or what can a man give in exchange for his soul?" (Vs. 37). Jesus is saying this because He wants us to know that our souls are the most valuable things we possess. The writer of the Book of Ecclesiastes puts it this way; "And the dust returns to the ground it came from, and the spirit returns to God who gave it" (12:7). Everything else perishes, but the spirit (soul) survives...In the Tate Gallery in London there is one of the last and most notable paintings of the artist Frederick Watts. It depicts a shrouded figure on a bier in the middle of a room and on a table nearby is an open book, and against the table leans a silent lyre. In one corner of the room is the rich mantle of a nobleman, and in the other corner a lance, shield and several pieces of armor with roses strewn over them to show that the rich arts and tastes of the world were mingled with the sterner duties of life. But now it is all over! The still form cannot read the book or play the lyre, don the mantle, nor catch the fragrance of the roses. All is over, and on the wall in the background are these words; "What I spent I had. What I saved I lost. What I gave I have." What we give of our time, money, enthusiasm, tears and labors to the salvation of souls is ours, and ours forever. Everything else perishes. It is understandable that Jesus commanded us to preach the gospel to every creature (Matt.28:18-20; Mk.16:15). The words we speak about the Lord, and the actions that reflect those words, are what will let those around us know about the concern we have for their souls... It is just another aspect of our desire to be wise people...

Who Is A Wise Person - One Who Hears And Obeys The Lord

"Who is wise and understanding among you?" (Jas.3:13). "Therefore everyone who hears these words of mine and puts them into practice is like a wise man who built his house on the rock. The rain came down, and streams rose, and the winds blew and beat against that house; yet it did not fall, because it had its foundation on the rock. But everyone who hears these words of mine and does not put them into practice is like a foolish man who built his house on the sand. The rains came down, the streams rose, and the winds blew and beat against the house, and it fell with a great crash" (Matt.7:24-28).

When the writer of the Book of Ecclesiastes sums up all he has written, this is the conclusion that is drawn...."Fear God and keep His commandments, for this is the whole duty of man" (12:13). God has

been calling folks to Him as long as words have been written. Not only are the words to be read, but they are to be obeyed and put into practice. If you are close to my generation, you probably sang children's songs when you were young. One of my favorites, both to sing and lead was about the Wise Man, who built his house upon the rock...It came complete with many motions that kids seem to like... After the foolish man's house crashed, we always sang this verse; "Sooooooooo, Build your house on the Lord Jesus Christ, build your house on the Lord Jesus Christ; So build your house on the Lord Jesus Christ, and the blessings will come down...." It came with motions too. We are never too young to be taught about what we must hear and obey. Many folks in the world spend entirely too much time in self-satisfaction, rather than God-satisfaction... James also gives us this tidbit of good information; "Do not merely listen to the Word, and so deceive yourselves. Do what it says" (1:22). A story is told of a skeptical soap-maker who said to a preacher; "The gospel you teach has not done much good in the world, because I see a lot of wicked people." About that time, they saw some kids playing in the mud, who bore evidence of it. The preacher said; "Your soap has not done much good, because there are still a lot of dirty people...." The soap-maker replied, "Well, soap only cleans those who use it." This was the perfect opening for the preacher, as he said; "You are exactly right. So it is with the gospel. It blesses only those who obey and use it..." Lets all be counted among those who realize the importance of both hearing the Word and obeying it. It would be wise for us to read and meditate on James 1:22-25 today...

"Who is wise and understanding among you?" (Jas.3:13). "Each of you should look not only to your own interests, but also to the interests of others" (Phil.2:4).

Have you ever been around people whose conversation is always about themselves? How much fun is that, and how much time do you spend with them? As we continue on our guest to be as wise as we can be, we naturally come to relationships. I believe that a wise person sees the importance of solid relationships and does everything possible to cultivate them. As we look at today's verse, the apostle Paul is putting an emphasis on how we are to really interact with others. If we look at other folks as mere subsidiaries of a larger picture, we're missing the point. Paul says that a wise person looks at others in a special kind of way. By showing a genuine interest in others, relationships grow and mature. When others realize that we are truly interested in them, friendships ensue. We cannot hope to have a positive influence on others, if we do not make a real attempt to get to know them. I believe that the best congregations of Christians are those in which the members take Phil.2:4 seriously. One of the things that I love most about our community of believers in Northfield, is their reluctance to quickly walk out the building after services. At the close of services, I go to the front door to speak with as many of our members and visitors as possible. The greatest joy I have is watching folks in front of me gathering in small pockets, interacting with one another. Why do they do this? I think that it is all about their cultivating relationships with one another. After a couple of minutes at the front door, I realize that if I'm going to enjoy the fellowshipping, that I must move forward into the group. I truly believe that the wise and understanding person looks not only on their own interests, but also on the interests of others... How are you doing with that?

# 01/19/2017 Who Is A Wise Person? One Who Is Prepared

"Who is wise and understanding among you?" (Jas.3:13). "At that time the kingdom of heaven will be like ten virgins who took their lamps and went out to meet the bridegroom. Five of them were foolish and five were wise. The foolish ones took their lamps but did not take any oil with them. The wise, however, took oil in jars with their lamps. The bridegroom was a long time in coming and they all became drowsy and fell asleep...." (Matt.25:1-5).

I am sure that all of you know the rest of this parable. When they woke up, they all trimmed their lamps. The foolish ones asked the wise for some of their oil, but the wise replied that there might not be enough for all of them. While they went off to buy more oil, the bridegroom came and they missed their opportunity to attend the feast... Bottom line? "Therefore keep watch, (be prepared) because you do not know the day or the hour..." (Vs. 13). As we finish this series about who is a wise person, I think this last piece of advice is predictable. The wise person is prepared, while the foolish are often not. There is a wonderful movie out there (1999) entitled "Blast From The Past." # **High Standards**

"You have heard it said, 'Love your neighbor and hate your enemy.' But I tell you: Love your enemies and pray for those that persecute you, that you may be sons of your Father in heaven. He causes his sun to rise and set on the evil and the good. and sends rain on the righteous and unrighteous" (Matt.5:43-45).

Have you heard any of these? "I don't get mad, I get even." "You'll get yours." "Don't try that again." In today's verses, Jesus is teaching a higher standard of living. They are in direct contrast to the practical workings of the law of Moses. In the Law, folks took an "eye for an eye and tooth for a tooth" attitude as their mantra, and threw in loving one's neighbors, but hating their enemies as an extra... Jesus calls us to a higher standard of living. This may be one of the most difficult teachings to live by in the Bible, but Jesus exemplified it in his dying moments when He prayed for His enemies. Stephen, generally thought of as the first Christian martyr, took up the mantle. His enemies stoned him to death for his belief and testimony, and his last words in Acts 6:60 were these; "Lord, do not hold this sin against them..." In today's turbulent world, many think that is virtually impossible to love an enemy... But love has many degrees, and the degree that prompts us to bless an enemy and pray for him is the love that is enjoined upon us... Lest we think that this loving one's enemies is some kind of afterthought that Jesus had, lets take a look at Paul's writings to the Roman church... "Do not repay anyone evil for evil. Be careful to do what is right in the eyes of everybody. If it is possible, as far as it depends on you, live at peace with everyone. Do not take revenge, my friends, but leave room for God's wrath, for it is written; 'It is mine to avenge; I will repay,' says the Lord. On the contrary; "If your enemy is hungry, feed him; if he is thirsty, give him something to drink. In doing this, you will heap burning coals on his head...' Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good" (17-21). It is all about overcoming evil with good... This week, we will take a look at the higher standards we are held to as Christians. Hopefully, it will be both challenging and enlightening...

There were a set of villainous characters in the cartoons called the Really, Really Rottens who did their devious best to confound the Scooby Doobies and Yogi Yahooies...This may be a stretch to get to my point, but are there groups of people in the world that we might classify as really, really rottens? There certainly were in Jesus' day. Lets see now.... The Jews disliked the pagans, the Gentiles, the Samaritans, and of course, those dreaded publicans or tax collectors. The Jews considered the publicans to be really, really rotten. It was bad enough that the Jews were under control of the Roman government itself, but to pay

taxes was particularly galling. The Romans farmed out this tax collecting business to locals (Jews) within the province to exact. Needless to say, they were considered to be turncoats and thought to be unscrupulous. It is against this backdrop that Jesus teaches about a higher standard of living. Jesus told the people that even those really, really rotten publicans loved those who loved them. (Vs.46). What Jesus was trying to get across is that there is no real praise in this kind of love. You might want to read Lk.6:27-37 to get more insight. Here it is in a nutshell... Christians are supposed to display a love that separates them from the sinners. When the world can't tell the difference between the good guys and the bad guys, there is something drastically wrong. Christ demands that we unselfishly do good, and tops it off with this; "Without expectation to get anything back..." (Lk.6:35). Let me finish with a story. There was a church member who was in need of a favor from some other church member, that said this; "I wish now I had invited them into my home, but I never thought I would need them for anything..." She was living on the same standard as the sinners... I find it most interesting that Jesus went to the really, really rottens... Why? Because they were the ones who needed help. Christian high standards are supposed to raise the lower standards of the world. How are we doing with this?
