05/01/2015 The Importance Of Remembering



05/05/2015 Remembering Jesus' Words

"Just as he was speaking, the rooster crowed. The Lord turned and look straight at Peter. Then Peter remembered the word the Lord had spoken to him...'before the rooster crows today, you will deny me three times.' He went outside and wept bitterly" (Lk.22:61-62).

After he remembered the words Jesus had spoken to him, Peter realized what he had done and cried... If that were the entire story, Peter would have been a abject failure. The great thing is that Peter remembered many of the other words that Jesus had spoken and became the great stalwart for the Lord he was supposed to become. We would do well to follow the footsteps of Peter (not the denial part) and remember Jesus' words. He was the greatest teacher that ever lived, and his words echo through the corridors of time. On the third day following the crucifixion, women took spices to anoint Jesus' body. But when they got there, the stone was rolled away and the body missing. The two men (angels) told them: "The Son of Man must be delivered into the hands of sinful men, be crucified, and on the third day be raised..." (Lk.24:7). The women's response? "And then they remembered His words..." (V 8). We also must remember His words, and when we do they will constrain us to obey, serve, give, fellowship and worship. Lastly, there are these words of Jesus that we must remember: "He who rejects me and does not receive My sayings (remember them) has one who judges him; the word I spoke is what will judge him at the last day" (Jn.12:48). Jesus is quite clear that we will be judged upon our adherence to His Word... It is so important for us to dwell on Jesus' words, but also these coming from Peter: "Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life" (Jn.6:68).

05/06/2015 Remembering Jesus' Return

"Do not let your heart be troubled. Trust in God; trust also in Me. In my Father's house are many rooms; if it were not so, I would have told you. And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will

come back and take you to be with Me that you may be where I am. You know the way to where I am going" (Jn.14:1-4).

As we complete this short series of things to remember about Jesus, it all comes together with the realization that Jesus will be coming back one day. After telling His disciples that He would be leaving them, today's verses were written as words of comfort. Jesus did not apply a time and date for His return, because He wants us to live each day as if His return is eminent...

Jesus actually said these words: "No one knows about that day or hour, not even the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father" (Matt.24:36). What He wants of us is to live a life that reflects His teachings. He has this powerful desire that we obey Him into salvation. Then comes our service to Him, our giving of ourselves, Our fellowshiping together and our worship. Jesus actually couched His return with these words: "Therefore, keep watch, because you do not know the day or the hour" (Matt.25:13). When Paul saw the end near he wrote these words to Timothy: "Now there is in store for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, will award me on that day ----- and not only to me, but also to all those who have longed for His appearing" (2 Tim.4:7-8). Isn't it a bit ironic that we remember many things we should forget and forget any things we ought to remember. Each Lord's day when we gather about His special table, He says, do this in my remembrance...

05/07/2015 A Bit Of Symbiosis Please

"But I have prayed for you, Simon, that your faith may not fail. And when you have turned back, strengthen your brothers" (Lk.22:32).

If I might ask you to clear away the cobwebs, and remember some stuff from a high school or college biology class, you just might recall the term symbiosis. It is the relationship between organisms of different species in which both gain a benefit. You might even remember mutualism, which is similar... There are also parasitic and commensual relationships in which only one organism gets a benefit and the other may even be harmed. Today's verse from the gospel of Luke, takes place just after Jesus lets Peter know that he will deny Him three times on the night of His betrayal. Look at how beautiful this verse is. Rather than chastising Peter for his weakness, Jesus prays that he might not fail. Now some might look at it this way... Peter had known Jesus for about three years and they had become very close friends... Jesus was just trying to encourage Peter and lift him up because its what friends do for one another, but there's more! He says this to Peter... When you get it all in order and you have turned back, strengthen your brothers! Wow... Jesus lets Peter know, just as He does us, that there's a greater responsibility out there than just growing personally... In the Lord's body, its not enough. But rather, we must be concerned about whether our fellow Christians are growing too. If it works

the way its supposed to, here's where the symbiosis kicks in. We will all "be spurring one another on toward love and good deeds..." (Heb.10:24). A little more about this tomorrow...

When I allow a person to run my boat, if they have never steered one very often, I tell them about those "mid-course corrections..." Unless there is an emergency, the changes of direction ought to be slight. Though there may be a need to adjust one's direction, it is usually just a very small change. A problem that many of us have, though, is assuming that our attitudes are totally acceptable, when in reality, they need a slight change... You know.... A mid-course correction. Like a boat going slightly off course, attitudes have a way of changing without our noticing. Today's verse is referring to one's attitude about the Lord's Supper, but the idea that a man ought to examine himself pertains to literally everything we do in life... That's why periodic self-examinations ----- and they need to be honest examinations ----- are so important. To do the Lord's work both faithfully and effectively may require a few mid-course corrections. Lets go through the week thinking about the importance of attitudes and be more careful about our own. Many congregations are blessed with members who have numerous talents and abilities in the work the Lord has given us. Those talents will not be as productive as they should be if the matter of attitude is not given a priority. Lets be sure that our work will be helped and not hindered by the way we choose to think, and be thankful for the work we can do together.

When we are able to do this, I think we'll find that we fit in.

I don't want to break anyone's bubble about feeling a warmth during worship services... When I don't feel it, I will probably think that something is amiss. Just think of this though... Do I want to bet my eternal life on the way I feel? Lets explore this in a little more depth over the next few days....

05/15/2015 No Bump On A Log



There is one thing that we must hold above all others during our worship time, and this is it... No matter who we are with... No matter how good or bad the singing or sermon are, here it is! We are in the presence of our incomparable God and we must respond with awe and reverence. "And I stand, I stand in awe of You, I stand, I stand in awe of You; Holy God to whom all praise is due, I STAND IN AWE OF YOU....

05/18/2015 Worship Mourning "The sacrifices of God are a broken spirit; a broken and contrite heart" (Psa.51:17).

My lesson yesterday at Northfield was all about looking forward to Sunday. The last two devotionals involved what we are supposed to get out of worship that included some deep emotions. In the 51st Psalm, King David is remorseful about his sin with Bathsheba. His humble prayer for forgiveness and cleansing is that of a contrite sinner. It is popular to look at worship today, even the Lord's Supper, as a celebration, with every aspect of it upbeat. There is, however, a great deal to mourn in worship. While celebrating God's grace to us at the cross, we might also express remorse that it was our sins that sent Jesus there. In today's verse, David declares that the sacrifices of God require "a broken and contrite heart..." I can't help but remembering the Parable of the Pharisee and the Tax Collector. The Pharisee was "celebrating" his goodness and righteousness, while the tax collector stood at a distance and would not even look up to heaven, but beat his breast... His worship consisted of this: "God, have mercy on me, a sinner" (Lk.18:9-13). Our sinful condition suggests that the proper attitude in God's presence ought to be deep humility. James called on us to "humble yourselves before the Lord, and He will lift you up..." (4:10). In worship, we are to humble ourselves before the Lord. Though worship is a celebration, we must remember what bought us together... When we do we'll be thankful for Jesus' sacrifice for us and be humbled...

05/19/2015 Worship With Joy And Gratitude

"With praise and thanksgiving they sang to the Lord: 'He is good; His love to Israel endures forever' " (Ez.3:11)..... "Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: Rejoice! Let your gentleness be evident to all. The Lord is near. Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God" (Phil.4:4-6).

In the first verse I used this morning, the Israelites have returned from the Babylonian captivity. They are gathered at the site of the foundation of the new temple and are singing from Psalm 107... "For He is good, His steadfast love toward Israel endures forever..." Although some wept because they remembered the magnificence of Solomon's temple, others shouted for joy because of the possibilities of a newly established Israel. They must have been deeply aware of God's steadfast love for them, in that He did not abandon them in their exile. In worship, we too ought to experience a profound gratitude, as we celebrate Gods' great patience, His mercy and His Son's death on the cross. If this does fill us completely with gratitude, nothing will. The second verse I am using this morning comes from the Book of Philippians. The apostle Paul, as if he knows about our deep gratitude, lets us in on something else. He says this: "Rejoice in the Lord always..." To make sure that we get it, he proclaims: "I will say it again: Rejoice!" Anticipating that we might have some problems or difficulties in our lives, or in the lives of those

close to us, he adds this: "Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God..." The profound gratitude we started with should lead to joyful praise and proclamation of His great acts of salvation.... Gratitude and praise in our worship... They are perfect together...

05/20/2015 Worshiping To Do Right

"Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, 'Whom shall I send? And who will go for us?' And I said, 'Here am I. Send me' " (Isa.6:8).

Is being determined an emotion? I submit to you, that if it is not, it ought to be... As we look at today's verse about Isaiah's historic commission, what else could it be? Isaiah's fateful vision of a holy God ends with God issuing a summons to serve. In the presence of God, Isaiah makes a life-changing decision and says determinedly, "Here am I. Send me..." You and I might not say those exact words, but there ought to be a moment in worship, whether we say it in our hearts, to others or only before God that we might say something like this.... "Send me" or "Use me" or "Show me the way...." If our worship does not engender this emotion of determination, I feel that it may be vain or empty. Worship should draw from a part of us that is accessed in no other arena of human activity. In our worship, God who is Spirit is worshiped by our spirit. That spirit is the part of us that is most deeply human and the part that will live beyond this life... Jesus said this to the Samaritan woman at the well: "God is spirit, and His worshipers must worship in spirit and in truth..." (Jn.4:24). Worship ought to employ feelings that are deeper than those toward a hobby, team or some human activity. Our bodies might be sitting in the pew, but it is our spirits that meet God in worship...

05/21/2015 What Kind Of Person Should I Be?

"What kind of people ought you to be? You ought to live holy and and godly lives as you look forward to the day of God and speed its coming" (2 Pet.3:11-12).

In Chapter three of 2 Peter, he is talking about "the day of the Lord..." This means Jesus' return and the eternity which awaits. In view of this, its context ought to have a sobering effect on us as we look at today's title, "What kind of person should I be..." I think that Peter wrote the

question with the intent that we would get our lives in order, so that when our time is up we would be ready for Jesus' return. I have chosen a few "ways" that we ought to be. It is far from a completely comprehensive list, but maybe a challenge for each of us might be to answer it or even find things to add to it. It will take me a few days to get through the list of the type of people we ought to be, so it will give us all time to reflect and maybe see a thing or two that I left out. My first attribute is that of being steadfast people. The word steadfast means firm in purpose and unwavering. It connotes being strong in our faith. Being steadfast is a condition of success in literally every endeavor of life. Jesus strongly admonishes the church at Laodicea in the Book of Revelation for being wishy/washy or lukewarm... There was no steadfastness among those people... The earliest Christians (Acts 2) at Jerusalem did this: "They devoted themselves to the apostles teaching and to the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer" (2:42). Now that's being steadfast! The apostle Paul used these words to promote steadfastness: "Therefore. my beloved brethren, be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that your toil is not in vain in the Lord" (1 Cor.15:58)..... "Be on the alert, stand firm in the faith..." (1 Cor.16:13). Tomorrow we will look at another way or two we ought to be....

I would submit to all of you and myself, that we ought to be prayerful people. Prayer is a wonderful friend, but do we make enough use of it? I am often intrigued that when a tragic event takes place in the world, that the reporter bringing the story will end it with something like this.... "Our prayers go out to...." It is so easy to say that our prayers are going out, but another thing all together to mean it and actually say the prayer. Prayer is that lofty expression of trust and submission, and is our inseparable union with God. Some people pray when they have given up all human hope, and I get that. In my humble opinion, however, prayer should not be a last resort, but a first... Jesus wanted us to pray so much, that he dedicated a part of the Sermon On The Mount to it. When you get a bit of time today, read and meditate upon Matt.6:5-14... I admit being a fan of the hymn "Father Hear The Prayer We Offer." There are four verses that are also worth reading and contemplating. The last verse reflects almost everyone's lives. Our daily walk might be bright or dreary, and storm or sunshine may be our share. We should never get tired of

praying because it is where hope begins... "May our souls in hope un-weary, Make Thy work our ceaseless prayer..." The reading from Matt.6 tells us that Jesus wants us to be prayerful people, and Paul's teachings certainly echo His. "Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be known to God" (Phil.4:6).... The apostle Paul did not use the wonderful example of unity in 1 Corinthians, chapter four just to hear himself talk. In it he compares the diversity of talents to parts of the human body and lets us know that all are important to the body functioning at is best. The writer of the Book of Ecclesiastes says that "a cord of three strands is not easily broken"

(3:12). Don't you love it when things hum along smoothly? Along with cooperation, understanding sacrifice is important too. Christianity was born through sacrifice. As a coach, I demonstrated certain skills to my athletes and asked them to perform them the same way. I used instructional films and asked them to imitate the person on the film. "You are the salt of the earth. But if the salt loses its saltiness, how can it be made salty again?" "You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden. Neither do people light a lamp and put it under a bowl." (Matt.5:13-15). I believe that the Lord calls on us to be examples, just as Paul echoed in today's verses. James also held to this teaching when he wrote; "Show me your faith without deeds, an I will show you my faith by what I do..." (2:18). Even men of the Bible, like Jonah or Moses, tried to hide behind some weakness rather than step up to the plate and do God's will. God shows us that the most effective sermon is a well-lived life...
